Reverend Scott Daruma Mangis, PhD, is an American Zen Monk who returned to the US in 2019 from living in Tokyo studying and practicing Zen for over ten years.

His ordination was in 2013, nine months after his youngest daughter made her way into the world. It was also two months after he resigned from his career, returned his cell phone, gave up his company apartment, and dropped off his company car. This all looked like a very sudden decision at the time but looking back felt that this journey of study, practice and meditation started over twenty years earlier. For the next six years he spent his days with his daughter, at the temple, and standing in front of the train station near his apartment in Japan doing Takuhatsu, chanting and accepting donations. He currently lives in North Carolina with his family. He shares the Dharma through his website, <http://www.thesetsuna.com>, opening the gates of wisdom and compassion to the world through consultation and energetic healing.

HANAMATSURI, THE CELEBRATION OF BUDDHA'S BIRTH

Hanamatsuri, literally a flower festival, is celebrated on April 8, commemorating the birth of Siddhartha Gautama. Siddhartha became enlightened as Sakyamuni Buddha, which marks the release of sentient beings from suffering and sorrow.

According to our tradition, the historical Buddha, Sakyamuni, was born in Nepal on April 8, 566 B.C. He was born the son of King Suddodhana and Queen Maya. There are many flowery descriptions of the scene at his birth, including celestial birds singing beautiful songs, beautiful flowers, and a sweet, gentle rain bathing the baby Buddha. It is not necessarily the beauty of the flowers, the sounds of the celestial birds, nor the sweet, gentle rain that fell, but the vibrant fact that on this day was born the greatest of sentient beings who became the Enlightened One, the Buddha.

Every year we celebrate our own birthday. In our youth, we are anxious to reach "adulthood," and in our old age, we attempt to cling to our "youth." What is the meaning and reason for celebrating our birth? Much of the meaning of our own birth is often lost in the gifts and the merriment. The celebration of our birth is an expression of gratitude. This gratitude is extended to our friends, parents, and to life itself. This gratitude grows from an understanding that our birth is the result of many people and that our lives are intertwined with all others.

Understanding the Buddha's teaching of the interdependency of all things will make it clear that our birth is the result of many causes and conditions. Realizing this, we can see that our birth is truly a rare and wonderful gift, and we have an obligation to live out this life in accordance with the teachings of the Buddha.

This obligation to live our lives out to the fullest becomes even more striking when we look at the symbolism and significance of the flower. The flower, as with all human beings, has youth and beauty, but it dies, and it is the seed of our demise. When we can understand our impermanent nature, it becomes apparent how we should live our lives.

From the murky depths of this quagmire of life, there still are occasions when sentient beings may, out of the sincerity of mind, effort, and intelligence, produce pure thoughts which may bloom into the ultimate purity of the white lotus, enlightenment. Hanamatsuri represents one of these occasions. It is a time for us to show our gratitude and rededicate ourselves as we contemplate the importance of the birth of our teacher, master, spiritual guide, and friend, Sakyamuni Buddha.

This year, Kauai Buddhist Council will be celebrating the Birth of Syakamuni Buddha on April 9, 9:30 am at Kauai Soto Zen in Hanapepe. Please encourage your family and friend to attend this Great Event.

Bishop's Corner

Bishop Eric Matsumoto

“Here I rejoice in what I have heard and extol what I have attained.”

I would like to begin by sharing the Opening Aspiration and some thoughts which I gave at the start of our 111th Legislative Assembly held on February 10-11, 2023.

“How joyous I am, my heart and mind being rooted in the Buddha-Dharma...of the universal Vow... my thoughts and feelings flowing within the dharmaocean...I am deeply aware of the Tathagata’s immense compassion...My joy grows ever fuller, my gratitude and indebtedness ever more compelling. Therefore, I have selected [passages expressing] the core of the Pure Land way and gathered its essentials. ...May those who see and hear this work be brought...to manifest shinjin within the power of the Vow and reveal the incomparable fruit of enlightenment in the land of peace.” -Shinran Shonin-

This should be all of our thoughts and aspiration too, especially in 2023 as we joyously and gratefully observe the auspicious Joint Celebration of the 850th Anniversary of the Birth of Shinran Shonin and the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of Jodo Shinshu including the 17th World Buddhist Women’s Convention.

Last year, our Hawaii Kyodan’s slogan emphasized “Connecting with Others” and I emphasized that the primal and fundamental connection which we each should have is the connection with Amida Buddha. Then, from that connection, we, as Sangha members, further connect with others inspired by the Buddha, guided by the Dharma and motivated by gratitude for Amida Buddha’s Wisdom and Compassion. This becomes apparent in the guidance we are receiving from His Eminence Kojun Ohtani whether it is “Gratitude for the Jodo Shinshu Teaching” or “Our Pledge” which he composed for us.

However, as I look at our Hawaii Kyodan and reflect on myself too, I have a concern that we have not connected with as many people as we would like

to. What do you think? The steady decline in our membership suggests that we have not. Thus, today, I implore that we all share our joy for the Teachings and especially Amida Buddha’s compassion with others. Let your family and friends know that temple is a big part of your life and the reasons why. If you don’t people including your own family may not know. Just because you physically go to the temple a lot does not mean that those around you truly understand the significance of the temple and the Teachings in your life. As your Bishop and as a temple minister, I have come across, too many, families especially grandchildren and great grandchildren of our most devoted members who didn’t know just how precious the temple was to their Elders. Its only at the funeral service that they find out. I lament that it is a lost opportunity. If younger family members knew how important temple was to their Elders including the reason, they too, could have possibly connected more with the temple and Jodo Shinshu.

Even in the case of Shinran Shonin, I find, at least, 4 instances, one of which is the opening aspiration with which I started, in which he relates that out of the gratitude of realizing the benevolence of the Buddha and Joy, he collects passages about Jodo Shinshu so others can come to know Amida Buddha. I am not saying we all have to write a book like Shinran Shonin, but in our own way, within our own capacities, we can share about Buddhism with others. In Hawaii, we would say “We can all talk story.” On second thought, however, our sharing does not necessarily have to involve lengthy words explaining Buddhism. I say this as I reflect on my own journey to Jodo Shinshu. My grandmother (Fuji Matsumoto), according to some like Rev. Yoshihide Matsubayashi, was a devout Jodo Shin Buddhist, but she could not speak English and I, in my Middle School and High School years, could not speak Japanese. Her way of connecting me to Buddhism was to have me see her doing her daily “Praising of the Buddha’s Virtue” at the home altar (which was not in her bedroom, but in the family living room). She, also, gave me the responsibility of changing the flowers on the Home Altar. So, it was that in the Matsumoto household, a Middle School kid

would regularly, on a weekly basis, change the flowers at the home butsudān. From within my family, it was the first recognizable (for me) step in the budding and growing relationship that I would have with Buddhism.

Sounding like a broken record, I still firmly believe that we need more of the Buddha-Dharma to inspire and guide us as a Sangha and one of our roles as the Sangha, not limited to ministers, is to create a connection to the Dharma for people. This is what will eventually connect to growing our membership. People are searching for a warm, harmonious, safe accepting place to belong where people are happy, empathetic, and joyous. Especially, as we come out of the Pandemic it is an important time to connect with others by sharing our Joy and Appreciation of the Nembutsu. It is essential, critical that we connect with more people. It is by connecting with more people that we can also address our declining membership. Thus, at this time, guided by our 2023 slogan "Sharing Joy Together," I would like to ask all temples to create a membership committee or something similar to it, to address our declining membership. Further, I have brought to the attention of the State Ministers Association and the Ministerial Training Committee, our need to begin identifying and nurturing more individuals who can become ministers lay assistants or full-fledged overseas ministers. However, a committee can only do so much. The real work of connecting takes place at the temple level by each one of us. First, please let that Heart and Mind of True Entrusting being given by Amida Buddha blossom. Then, naturally, share your Joy and Appreciation of Dharma especially that of Namō Amida Butsu with others by living the life of a Nembutsu follower as shared by His Eminence Kojun Ohtani.

To conclude, to one and all, please know that your devotion, dedication, contributions and efforts are deeply appreciated and I express my deepest gratitude to you. Please join me in gassho/anjali and in awareness, joy and gratitude, join me to recite Namō Amida Butsu, The Buddha's Name Which I Call in gratitude in response to Namō Amida Butsu, The Buddha's Name Which Calls Me to entrust. Namō

Amida Butsu/Entrusting in All-Inclusive Wisdom and All-Embracing Compassion.

Food Drive

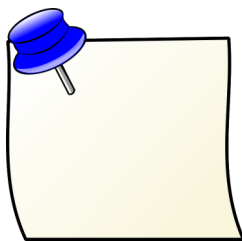

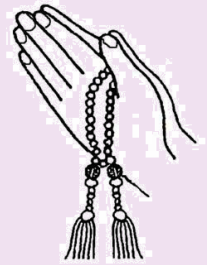

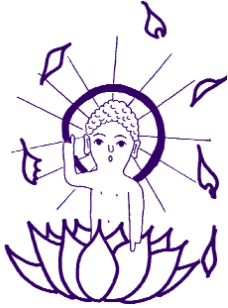
