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Living Treasures

"The Living Treasures of Hawaii is a program instituted by the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii to recognize and honor individuals for their sustained contributions toward enriching our society." The Living Treasures program is designed to "Preserve and perpetuate the islands' cultural and artistic heritage." Since the program's inception in 1976, over two hundred of Hawaii's people, including educators, dancers, artists, clergy, business leaders, and community volunteers, among others, have been named Living Treasures of Hawaii.

Recipients to be honored in 2024:

Julian Keikilani Ako, retired teacher and administrator, Kamehameha Schools; Hawaiian music composer and musicologist, leader in the indigenization of curriculum, promoter of international studies and relations, and regenerative tourism

Douglas D.I.Chong, leader of Hawaii's Chinese history with the Hawaii Chinese History Center, Chinese Chamber of Commerce, United Chinese Society, oral historian, author of Chinese community history, cultural values, educator, U.H. Research Corporation, Department of Education

Sarah 'Ilialoha Ayat Quick Keahi, reviver of Hawaiian language at Kamehemeha Schools, where she taught for 37 years; legacy includes former students teaching 'Ōlelo Hawai'i across the state at all levels, from immersion to university

Davianna Pomaikai'i McGregor, PhD, Professor Emeritus, Ethnic Studies Department; Director Oral History Center, University of Hawai'i; one of the primary leaders of the Protect Kaho'olawe 'Ohana; author of seminal book, "Nā Kua'āina: Living Hawaiian Culture"

Ricardo D. Trimillos, PhD, Professor Emeritus, Ethnomusicology, University of Hawai'i, perpetuator of Hawai'i's cultural, music, and artistic traditions, international consultant on ethnomusicology

Compassion: Although there is no requirement that any honoree belong to the Buddhist faith, the fundamental principle of Buddhist ethics is simple and clear in the selections-that all people should develop an attitude of compassion. Loving one's fellow human beings is seen as a way of diminishing love of self, as a way of breaking down the barriers that separate people from each other. An extension of this attitude is the concept of service to others. To honor those who have served others in their various ways, such as the Living Treasures of Hawaii has done, is the spirit of a fundamental Buddhist principle being applied in everyday lives.

"Sharing Nembutsu Moment"

On this occasion, I am deeply honored to share insights on the theme for 2024, the final year of our overarching theme, "Building Healthy Sanghas." This year's focus is on the profound and spiritually enriching slogan, "Sharing Nembutsu Moments," as eloquently explained by Rev. Eric Matsumoto, Former Bishop and Interim Director of the Office of Buddhist Education, in our 2024 HHMH calendar.

Before delving into the significance of "Nembutsu Moments," let us first understand what "Nembutsu" is. The term "Nembutsu" refers to invoking the name of Amida Buddha with a sincere heart. It is a profound and central

practice in Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, symbolizing True Entrusting (Shinjin) in the boundless compassion of Amida Buddha.

To truly understand the essence of a "Nembutsu Moment," let us reflect on Rev. Eric's wisdom. In its purest form, a "Nembutsu Moment" is that sacred instance, orchestrated by Amida Buddha's benevolence, when True Entrusting (Shinjin) unfolds. It is the moment when the heartfelt utterance of "Namo Amida Butsu" spontaneously arises, enveloping us in the awareness of Great Compassion. Each subsequent recitation of the Nembutsu becomes a joyous expression of gratitude, a recognition that Amida Buddha has embraced and never abandoned us.

Describing this moment is like attempting to capture the indescribable beauty that leaves us in awe. Rev. Eric's analogy captures it well—encountering something so profoundly beautiful that it renders us speechless, and all we can utter is a heartfelt "Wow!" Yet, these "Wow" moments are not isolated; they are continuous expressions of awe and gratitude, as explained in The Collected Works of Shinran, Volume Two: "...the moment of awakening of shinjin and saying the nembutsu is a moment both in and out of time."

However, the scope of "Nembutsu Moments" extends beyond the initial awakening. Our slogan encourages us to embrace and share other precious moments—Dharma-inspired instances of gratitude, joy, happiness, and meaningful reflections that have enriched our lives. These moments of our existence are filled with profound meaning and fulfillment and become like radiant gems.

So, let's share these gems! Imagine your joyous tales becoming the blockbuster hit of the Sangha, inspiring others like a spiritual Netflix series. We're not just building healthy Sanghas but constructing an amusement park of enlightenment, complete with rollercoaster realizations and merry-go-rounds of mindfulness.

As we traverse the final year of "Building Healthy Sanghas," let us wholeheartedly embrace the spirit of "Sharing Nembutsu Moments." May our shared stories become a source of inspiration, fostering connections and deepening our collective understanding of the boundless compassion of Amida Buddha.

I invite you to reflect on your own "Nembutsu Moments" and consider how sharing these moments can contribute to the well-being of our Sangha and the broader community. In this shared journey, we can continue to build healthy and harmonious communities grounded in the teachings of Amida Buddha.

LHM member Ronald Hanaoka, deceased, left \$50,000 to LHM to be used for scholarships of \$1000 per year for LHM members pursuing a post-secondary education. The general criteria for awarding the scholarship are:

- SCHOLARSHIP
- The applicant must be a member of Lihue Hongwanji Mission for at least 2 years.
- The applicant must be or plan to be enrolled in any accredited college, university, community college or vocational school in the United States.
- The applicant must be a senior in high school, or already enrolled in a qualified school.
- One scholarship will be awarded each year. If there is no qualified applicant in a year, an additional scholarship may be awarded in succeeding years.
- A student may be awarded the scholarship multiple times if there is no other qualified applicant.
- You may request the application form and complete requirements from Rev. Yagi or by emailing lihuehongwanjimission@gmail.com.
- The completed forms are due on April 15, 2024.


