The Lotus Flower



The lotus is one of the most well-known symbols

Nurturing Nembutsu: Cultivating Awareness



of Buddhism. In the center of our temple there is a statue of Amida Buddha on the altar. This statue is standing on the lotus flower. The lotus grows in the mud, but it blossoms purely and beautifully above the muddy water surface.

The environment of the muddy water allows the flower to rise and bloom above the murk. The mud nourishing the roots represents our messy human lives. It is through our human experiences and our suffering that we seek to break free and bloom. But while the flower rises above the mud, the roots and stem remain in the mud, where we live our lives. As one Buddhist saying puts it, "May we exist in muddy water with purity, like a lotus."

In Buddhist art, a fully blooming lotus flower signifies enlightenment and self-awareness, while a closed bud represents a time before enlightenment.

The lotus flower represents rebirth in a figurative sense. The rebirth can be a change of ideas, an acceptance of Buddha where there once was none, the dawn after one's darkest day, a renaissance of beliefs or the ability to see past wrongs.

"Lanterns — A Light to Rely On"

Aloha Lihue Hongwanji members and friends,

I would like to begin by expressing my heartfelt appreciation to everyone who helped make our Lihue Hongwanji Bon Festival on June 20 and 21 a wonderful success. Whether you helped with setting up, cooking, parking, selling food, cleaning, dancing in the Bon Odori, or quietly working behind the scenes, your dedication, hard work, and aloha made this event a meaningful gathering for both our temple and the wider Kaua'i

community.

This year, as I looked around at the glowing bon chochin—the lanterns hanging around our temple and Yagura—I was reminded of their deeper meaning. These lanterns are not just decorations. They symbolize the light of our loved ones who have passed away and the light of the Buddha's wisdom and compassion shining into our lives.

At the same time, I reflected on the words of Shakyamuni Buddha, spoken to his disciples near the end of his life: "Be a lamp unto yourselves. Rely on yourselves and rely on the Dharma."

These simple but powerful words remind us that although life brings uncertainty, change, and sorrow, we each carry the potential to awaken to wisdom. In Jodo Shinshu, however, we also recognize that relying on ourselves alone can be difficult. We are ordinary beings, often filled with doubt, self-centeredness, and limitations.

That is why Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu, encouraged us to rely not only on our limited selves, but on the working of Amida Buddha's great compassion, expressed through Namo Amida Butsu. This is the essence of Jodo Shinshu—the assurance that even though we may stumble, Amida's compassionate vow embraces us just as we are, guiding us toward awakening.

The light of the lanterns can be seen as the light of Amida Buddha's compassion, shining even in the darkness of our ignorance and suffering. When we recite "Namo Amida Butsu," we are reminded that we are never alone. We are supported by the boundless compassion of Amida Buddha, by the Dharma, and by our Sangha—the community of fellow travelers on the path.

In the same way, our Bon Festival was not the work of one person, but the collective effort of many. It reflected the very teachings of interdependence and gratitude that lie at the heart of Jodo Shinshu. The laughter, the smell of good food, the sound of taiko drums, the colorful yukata, and the graceful Bon Odori—all of it was possible because of the kindness and efforts of countless people.

As we move forward into the summer season, may the lanterns of Obon remind us:

- To honor our loved ones who came before us
- To recognize our own limitations with humility
- To rely on the light of Amida Buddha and the Dharma to guide us
- To live with gratitude, knowing that each day is supported by countless causes and conditions •

Thank you again for your hard work, your kindness, and your support for Lihue Hongwanji. May the light of wisdom and compassion continue to shine within our hearts and throughout our community.

Do You Remember? History at Lihue Hongwanji through the years

One of our key concepts in Shin Buddhism is Impermanence; nothing stays the same all things change. As we look around, we see that some changes are small and some are large. Some of the changes at LHM have happened over many decades.

- ⇒ Services Then: Sunday services were always full. People dressed up in their "Sunday Best" for the services. Men wore suits and ties. Women wore dresses and heels.
- ⇒ Services Now: The number of people attending services has decreased. People are dressed more casually now than previously ties and heels are not necessary.
- ⇒ Women's Groups Then: Originally there were 2 organizations, Fujinkai and Asaoka Club, for older and younger women. There were 2 conferences every year, one in the spring and another one in the fall. Women also provided entertainment for New Year's Parties and different groups provided the food every Saturday for the construction crews that built so much at LHM. The food was vital and integral to the work.
- ⇒ Women's Groups Now: In 1984 Fujinkai and Asoka Club were merged to form Lihue Hongwanji Women's Association, with Harue Tada as the first president. There is now only one conference held per year, in the fall. There are no cooking groups on Saturdays as there are no volunteer construction projects.

Wednesday, July 30, 6:30 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. (HST): Zoom Guest Speaker: Rev. Dr. Enrique Galvan-Alvarez

Rev. Dr. Enrique Galvan-Alvarez was born in the Canary Islands, but has spent most of his adult life in the UK. He encountered the Buddha's teaching in 2003 and he started practicing under various

Tibetan teachers. In 2011 he encountered Shinran Shonin's teaching and was deeply moved by the writings of Rev. Dr. Al Bloom, with whom he sustained a 5-year long correspondence. Rev. Dr. Galvan-Alvarez continued his study of Jodo Shinshu with other Sensei and Dharma friends, at Dr. Bloom's recommendation, in Europe, Japan and America. In 2019 he was ordained at Nishi Hongwanji. During the global Covid-19 pandemic, when all Buddhist activities went online, Rev. Dr. Galvan-Alvarez started forming a Spanish-language online group, Jinen-kō, which now has members across the Spanish speaking world. He also serves the Jodo Shinshu UK community, by offering online sessions and visiting members in their homes across England.

He was certified as Kyōshi minister in January 2025 and is currently organizing the 21st European Shin Conference, which will take place in Oxford in September 2025.
