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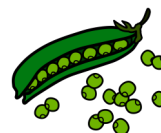
HOW TO PLANT YOUR GARDEN

- Peace of soul

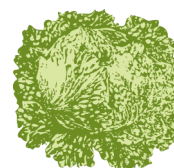


Be sure to plant 4 rows of "squash" –

Reflecting on Peace through the Nembutsu

This past month has been a time of deep reflection. September 11 reminded us once again of the tragic terrorist attacks in 2001. At that time, I was still in Japan. After a long day, I turned on the television and saw planes crashing into buildings. At first, I thought it was a movie. But as I realized the truth, my heart was filled with pain. Even from across the ocean, the sorrow was overwhelming. In our interconnected world, tragedy anywhere affects all of us.

On Kauai, a memorial service was held at Waimea Shingon Mission on September 7 to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II. The Proclamation issued by Mayor Derek Kawakami reminded us of the enduring spirit of the 100th Infantry Battalion and the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. These young men, many from Kaua'i, showed perseverance, humility, honor, and devotion, even while facing discrimination at home. Forty Kaua'i soldiers gave their lives, and their names are enshrined on the Waimea Shingon Mission's Memorial Tower. Their sacrifices remind us of both the cost of war and the responsibility to foster peace.

Shinran Shonin wrote:

“Full of compassion for the sentient beings of this defiled world,
Mahasthamaprapta encourages us to say the nembutsu;
He embraces the people of shinjin
And brings them into the Pure Land.”

(Pure Land Hymns on the Right, Semblance, and Last Dharma-Ages)

These words remind us that even in a world of conflict and suffering, compassion embraces us. Saying the Nembutsu—*Namo Amida Butsu*—is not simply reciting words, but awakening to Amida's unconditional embrace. It softens our hearts and allows us to live with gratitude and compassion toward others.

So, what can we as followers of the Nembutsu do? What should we do? We can begin with humility, remembering that we do not have all the answers. We can practice remembrance, honoring those who suffered and sacrificed in times of war and tragedy. And we can commit to peace in our daily lives—peace that begins with kindness, gratitude, and respect for each other. This spirit of peace was also celebrated in our own temple community. On September 22, members of the Lihue Hongwanji Women's Association and children from our Lihue Hongwanji Preschool joined together for the event “Ring Your Bell for Peace Day.” With smiles and laughter, they joyfully rang bells to express their hope for a peaceful world. Though simple, such acts remind us that peace is nurtured in everyday life, beginning with the small gestures we share with one another.

As we remember the lessons of 9/11, the sacrifices of WWII, and the joy of our Peace Day event, let us reflect once again on peace. Guided by Amida's boundless compassion, may we live each day with gratitude, humility, and the wish for a more peaceful world.

MESSAGE FROM BISHOP TOSHIYUKI UMITANI

Today we live in a world filled with information, yet also with isolation, confusion, and uncertainty. Sitting before Amida Buddha, placing our hands together, chanting the sutras, listening to a Dharma talk, meeting Dharma friends, and participating in temple activities—this is where the

This is why our work as ministers, board members, and committee chairs is so vital. We are not just managing finances and administration—we are helping ensure the soil stays fertile, the environment is right for growth, and people can bloom their flowers. Our leadership must ensure that our organization remains strong, welcoming, and meaningful for people today and for generations to come.

Looking ahead, we recognize the challenges we face. These challenges will not be solved overnight, but like seeds, growth takes time. Like farmers, we never know if this winter will be rainy or stormy, but with careful planning, open discussion, and sincere dedication to our mission, let us engage in what we can do today.

Once again, thank you for your dedication. Together, let us continue planting and nurturing the seeds of the Dharma so that our organization remains a source of light and inspiration for our communities—now and far into the future.

Do You Remember?

Bulletin/Newsletter Through the Years

⇒ Do you remember the story behind the logo on the front of our Dharma Wheel Newsletter? If not, please read on. The theme of our logo is “Many, But One” from the gatha by the same name. *“Like a Triangle, Circle, Square. We may well differ in how we look. Oh, the wonder of this life! For in the Buddha’s Vow, we are all embraced! Oh, we are many, but one. We are one together, here and now!”* The

words to the song “Many, But One” are the inspiration for our logo. The “Dharma Wheel,” the name of our bulletin replaces the circle, and is balanced by the triangle and square. The eight spokes of the Dharma Wheel represent the Eightfold Path, by which we live as One. It should be noted that Lynne Matsumura was the one who created the logo.

- ⇒ The contest for naming our newsletter was announced in the September and October 2012 newsletters. The winner, Spencer Tada, with his submission of “*Dharma Wheel*” was announced in the January 2013 edition, a month before the new format was introduced in February 2013. We chose from a list of 7 names submitted. This was the point where we began to refer to a “newsletter” instead of a “bulletin.”

Fun Facts about the Newsletter

- ⇒ The earliest copies of the LHM Bulletin that we have stored are from 1948. with copies bound in books in the minister’s office. At the time it was called “*Lihue Hongwanji News.*” Archives are wonderful and have so much information. We find history repeating itself.
- ⇒ Before LHM purchased a copy machine, a hand-cranked mimeograph machine was used for newsletter production. One person remembers throwing out her shoulder while cranking the mimeograph. Now? We have a copier that not only makes great copies automatically but produces them in 2-sided format, already collated and ready to fold. The wonders of technology!
- ⇒ We switched from producing the bulletin on a typewriter to using the computer around 1997, under the guidance of Rev. Yukiko Motoyoshi and Ms. Cynthia Masukawa. The first versions were with Microsoft Word but the format was changed to Publisher in 2011 under Rev. Itaru Nozaki.
- ⇒ Prior to April 2012, the ministers compiled the bulletin information. From that time on it has been produced and edited by lay volunteers. The change was made because the new minister, Rev. Bruce Nakamura, would have less time as he was also oversee minister for West Kauai.
- ⇒ We switched from using 8.5” x 14” paper (legal size) to 8.5” x 11” paper (letter size) beginning in May, 2012. This was in anticipation of sending out the Newsletter via email, realizing that most people do not have legal size paper at home. The change caused consternation for some as the newsletter could no longer be stapled prior to being mailed.
- ⇒ The first solicitation of emails for the electronic version of the newsletter was in our July 2012 newsletter. We were **Going Green** back then! It does save our temple a significant amount of money when we are able to email newsletters plus there is less waste going to the landfill or the paper recycling bins. The e-newsletters are also much more colorful than those received through the US Postal Service.

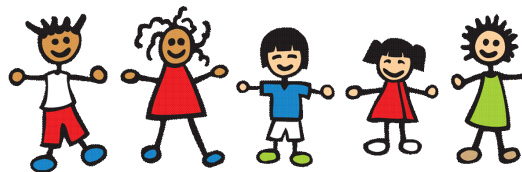

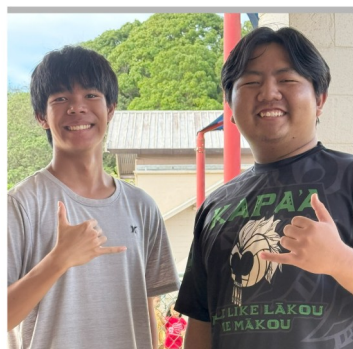
We are learning how to make friends , how special we are each in our own ways, and that there are different types of families.
