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Social Concerns

November is a special time to reflect on gratitude. Our Eitaikyo observance and Thanksgiving holiday offer opportunities to acknowledge the many causes and conditions supporting our lives and how deeply connected we are to the world around us. In this spirit of thankfulness, we launch our **2025-2026 Social Concerns Fund Drive.**

Your generosity allows the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii to support deserving organizations and programs that foster positive change in our community. Your selfless giving also helps us provide compassionate aid during disasters and respond effectively to issues affecting our local and global communities.

In response to federal funding cuts, we increased our support for local food banks that fight food insecurity in our community, donated to Hawaii Public Radio and PBS Hawaii to ensure access to quality public media, and supported Spill the Tea Café and The Trevor Project, which provide services for LGBTQIA+ youth. We also supported relief efforts after the devastating wildfires in Southern California and the earthquake in Myanmar and Thailand.

We continue to award Golden Chain Grants to support Sanghabased compassionate actions and Dana Matching Grants to boost the impact of charitable giving by organizations in the Hawaii Kyodan Ohana. We hope you will take advantage of these innovative programs that help share our values with the wider community.

The fundraising campaign will run from November 1, 2025, through August 31, 2026, with checks accepted any time. Please make all checks payable to Lihue Hongwanji, with a notation of "Social Concerns" on the memo line. LHM will then send a single combined check to the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii.


Office Hours

True Safety in Amida's Compassion

Recently, I had the joy of visiting our Preschoolers to share a short lesson about **Safety**. Together with the children, we talked about how to stay safe at home, at school, and outside. The students eagerly shared their ideas — "Don't touch fire!" "Don't talk to strangers!" "Tell an adult if you get hurt!"

Their smiles and bright voices reminded me that the wish to live safely is something we all share. Whether young or old, we all want to be free from fear, harm, and danger. But as we grow older, we begin to realize that no matter how careful we are, the world around us is full of change and uncertainty. We can follow every safety rule, yet we cannot

avoid all suffering, loss, or sadness. So, what does true safety really mean?

The Light of Amida — Our Ultimate Shelter

Shinran Shonin described Amida Buddha as "**Hikkyo-e**" (畢竟依) — the ultimate reliance or final refuge. He wrote:

"The light of purity is without compare. When a person encounters this light, all bonds of karma fall away; So take refuge in Amida, the ultimate shelter." (Jodo Wasan)

Amida's light offers a safety beyond this world — not the safety of strong walls or protection from all harm, but the deep assurance that we are **never abandoned**.

When we awaken to Amida's great compassion, we see that even in uncertain times, we are embraced. We are known completely — our fears, mistakes, and imperfections — and still loved unconditionally. This is the true meaning of **Namo Amida Butsu**: entrusting ourselves to the boundless compassion that always reaches us.

The Buddha's Safety Is Not Escape — It Is Embrace

Spiritual safety does not mean that nothing bad will ever happen. The Buddha does not promise a life free of challenges. Rather, Amida's light gives us the courage to face life as it is — with calm, compassion, and gratitude. Even in difficulty, we can say:

"Thank you for this life, just as it is, that allows me to hear the Dharma."

That is the deep, unshakable safety of **shinjin** — the heart of true entrusting.

From Outer Safety to Inner Safety

As the preschoolers learned about avoiding outer dangers — fire, sharp objects, and strangers — we adults continue learning to notice the *fires within us*: anger, greed, and ignorance.

The Buddha's wisdom helps us see these inner dangers clearly, and through the Nembutsu, they cool in the light of compassion.

The Dharma becomes our **safe harbor** — not by shielding us from life, but by helping us live within it more peacefully and kindly.

Living in Amida's Safe Harbor

True safety is not a place we go; it is the experience of being embraced by infinite compassion.

When we say Namo Amida Butsu, we are saying:

"I take refuge in the unchanging compassion that never abandons me."

That same wish to be safe — which I saw shining in the preschool children — is fulfilled completely in Amida's embrace.

May we live each day with gratitude, knowing that while the world changes, Amida's light never fades.

Namo Amida Butsu.
