The Light That Continues to Guide Us

As we enter the month of July, I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to everyone who helped make our Lihue Hongwanji Bon Dance on June 19 and 20 such a wonderful success.

From the many volunteers who spent weeks preparing food, built new Yagura, setting up tents, decorating the temple grounds, practicing dances, managing parking, selling foods, welcoming guests, and cleaning up afterward, your dedication and hard work made this year's Bon Dance possible. On behalf of the temple, thank you for sharing your time, energy, and spirit of cooperation. The success of Bon Dance is truly the result of many people working together with a common purpose.

Bon Dance is often seen as a community celebration filled with music, dancing, delicious food, and fellowship. While all of these are important parts of the tradition, Obon also invites us to pause and reflect upon a deeper question: How did we become who we are today?

The origin of Obon can be traced to a Buddhist story about Mokuren, a disciple of the Buddha who wished to repay the kindness of his mother. The heart of the story is gratitude. It reminds us not to forget the many people whose care and sacrifices support our lives.

In Jodo Shinshu, Obon is not a time when we believe our loved ones return to this world for a few days. Rather, it is a season of remembrance and gratitude. It is an opportunity to reflect upon the countless causes and conditions that have made our lives possible.

When we think about our parents, grandparents, relatives, teachers, friends, and mentors, we realize that their influence continues long after they are gone. Many of us have experienced moments when we catch ourselves saying something our parents used to say, preparing a favorite family recipe, or remembering a lesson that still guides us today. In these moments, we recognize that those who have passed away continue to live on through the values, kindness, and wisdom they shared with us.

During our Bon, we display Bon Chochin lanterns hanging the names of loved ones. These lanterns serve as beautiful reminders of those who came before us. They encourage us to remember with gratitude rather than sadness alone. They remind us that our lives are connected to many others, both past and present.

The light of the lantern surrounding the Yagura can also remind us of the boundless wisdom and compassion of Amida Buddha. Just as a lantern illuminates the darkness without discrimination, Amida Buddha's compassion embraces all beings exactly as they are.

As we reflect upon another Obon season, may we appreciate the many people whose lives continue to guide and inspire us. May we recognize the blessings we have received, and may we respond with hearts filled with gratitude.

Once again, thank you to everyone who contributed to this year's Bon Dance and to all who participated in our Bon and Hatsubon observances. Your support helps preserve these meaningful traditions for future generations.

HHMH REPRESENTED AT WHITE HOUSE VESAK

The International Buddhist Association of America (IBAA) hosted the Fifth Annual Vesak Lamp Lighting Ceremony at the White House in Washington, D.C., on June

11, 2026. This year's ceremony brought together Buddhist leaders, monastics, and representatives from diverse traditions, along with ambassadors and dignitaries from South and Southeast Asia, in a spirit of friendship, cultural understanding, and peace.

Representing the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, Bishop Toshiyuki Umitani attended the event together with Bishop Marvin Harada of the Buddhist Churches of America and Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara of the Jodo Shinshu International Office.

Vesak commemorates the birth, enlightenment, and parinirvana of Shakyamuni Buddha. Celebrated by Buddhists throughout the world for more than 2,500 years, Vesak was formally recognized by the United Nations in 1999 as an international day of significance.

This year's White House Vesak Ceremony was organized by Mrs. Wangmo Dixey, President of the IBAA, in cooperation with the White House Faith Office, particularly Pastor Paula White-Cain.

In her welcome message, Mrs. Dixey stated:

"This year is especially meaningful as our nation celebrates the 250th anniversary of the United States of America. It is fitting that we gather in this historic place, representing many cultures, traditions, and faiths, united by our shared aspirations for peace, understanding, and a better future for all. We are supported by the enduring American ideals of religious freedom and mutual respect—values that have allowed diverse spiritual traditions to flourish and contribute to the richness of our nation."

Mrs. Dixey also noted that Buddhism is practiced today by hundreds of millions of people around the world. Across the United States, nearly 4,000 temples, monasteries, meditation centers, and practice communities serve people from all walks of life. One of America's unique strengths, she explained, is that the Theravada, Mahayana, and Vajrayana traditions have all flourished side by side.

While many countries may be home to only one Buddhist tradition, the United States offers opportunities for Buddhists of different traditions to learn from, appreciate, and support one another while remaining united in their shared values.

The ceremony included messages from representatives of the White House Faith Office, the lighting of lamps, and chants and aspirations offered by representatives of the Theravada, Mahayana, and Vajrayana traditions. Bishop Marvin Harada lit the ceremonial lamp on behalf of the Mahayana tradition. Bishop Harada, Bishop Umitani, and Rev. Kuwahara then joined other Mahayana representatives in chanting sutras and offering aspirations for peace and harmony.

Reflecting on the experience, Bishop Umitani shared:

"It was truly a privilege and honor to participate in the Vesak Ceremony at the White House. As I joined the service, I felt the beauty of diversity and the richness of the Buddhist traditions that have flourished throughout the United States. As one of these traditions, the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii has both a place and a responsibility to continue sharing the Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion—values that transcend differences and unite humanity."

“Show, Don't Tell”

Guest Speaker: Rev. Dr. Aaron Shōken Proffitt



Many parents wonder how to weave Buddhist teachings into the fabric of family life. Bringing children to temple, enrolling them in Dharma School, chanting together before the butsudan — these are all meaningful entry points. But in this talk, I want to suggest something that may seem counterintuitive: that the most powerful way to share the Dharma with our children is not to teach it at all. When we ourselves are immersed in the teachings and practices of Buddhism — when the Dharma shapes how we speak, how we respond to difficulty, how we treat others — we don't need to explain that we are Buddhist. Our children will simply see it. The Dharma transmits not through instruction, but through presence. In other words: talk less. Show up more.

Rev. Dr. Aaron Shōken 正見 Proffitt is an Associate Professor of Japanese Studies in the East Asian Studies Department and an ordained Buddhist priest (tokudo) in the Jōdo Shinshū Hongwanji-ha lineage. Originally from Lynchburg, Tennessee, Rev. Dr. Proffitt received his BA and MA in religious studies from the University of Colorado, and his PhD in Buddhist studies from the University of Michigan. He studied Japanese at the Inter-University Center in Yokohama from 2009 to 2010 and conducted research as a Fulbright Fellow at Otani University, Koyasan University and Ryukoku University from 2014 to 2015. Rev. Dr. Proffitt serves the UAlbany Interfaith Center and Buddhist Student Association as a Buddhist chaplain. He also co-founded the Albany Buddhist Sangha (albanybuddhist.org) and regularly teaches mindfulness and meditation for community organizations in the Albany area.
